New High Schools in Novato Attract SM students

Novato has offered its own contributions to the growing trend of alternative schooling by opening two new alternative high schools this past year: the Marin School of the Arts and the Marin School of Arts and Technology. Though these schools offer positive alternatives for those disillusioned with the public school system, they have one major drawback that has been

our students. As a school that receives Average Daily Attendance funding, in other words, paid per pupil, this has a deep impact on San Marin because as each student leaves, so does a portion of our funding. San Marin now needs to compete with these schools, and the only way to do so is by understanding why students are leaving.

The Marin School of the Arts (MSA), located at the

Novato High campus, attempts to create the environment of a small arts college. MSA is able to provide classes that the regular schools can't provide because low enrollment combined

with a lack of funds. They have programs ranging from film and video to creative writing to dance. The school was created to bring students who share a passion for arts

together from a wide geographic region, and it is thus a magnet allowing school students from the Novato Unified School District and other districts in the Bay Area to apply. Its unique opportunities have already drawn many students to its doors, including a large number of

former San Marin students.

During the middle of the school year, San Marin junior Keith Tonini decided to enroll at MSA. Like most of the other students who go to MSA, Tonini decided to enroll so he could focus on the area that interested him: film. At MSA, students work on their focus for two class periods a day and then spend the rest of the time taking core classes, like English and math. Tonini

thinks that the best part is the relaxed environment that lets him focus on what he wants.

As public schools lose funding, they are forced to cut programs, and as we have seen in our own district, the electives are usually the first to go. Thus, to those already interested in the arts, charter schools like MSA

Threat of Mad Cow Disease Frightens America's Meat-Eaters By Sophie Orgish

In December of 2003, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's jarring announcement that mad cow disease had been discovered in an adult Holstein cow in Washington gave way to panic in many areas around the country. Dr. Ron DeHaven from the U.S. Agriculture Department says that the cow is believed to have been one of 74 that were imported from Canada into Idaho in 2001, but nothing has yet been confirmed. In the month since the cow's diagnosis, three herds in Washington have been quarantined, and the search for the source of infection continues.

Bovine spongiform encephalopathy, better known as mad cow disease

or BSE, is a neurological illness found in cattle that is caused by an infection from

an unidentified agent. The disease, known as Creutzfeldt-Jakob disorder in humans, is transmittable through the consumption of beef that has been infected by the disease. When contracted, the disease causes a change in personality, loss of body function, and eventually death, as neither of the two diseases has yet been cured. However, many students don't think that it's much of a problem, including Shaina sophomore Madfes, who says, "I think it's something to be cautious of if it becomes a greater threat, but at the moment I don't believe it's


discovery of BSE infection in the United States has caused at least 26 countries to ban American beef in an attempt to stop the possible spread of the disease through the ingestion of infected meat. This long list includes Japan, Mexico, and South Korea, which are three of America's largest meat exports. As a result, experts predict that the U.S. cattle industry could lose billions of dollars in beef sales.

Though mad cow disease is extremely dangerous if contracted, the chances of infection are not significantly high. In reality, the safest method of protection against BSE is to look into becoming a vegetarian.





License to Drive: Right or Privilege?

Citizens of every country are guaranteed certains rights and priveleges not available to non-citizen residents. However, United States has always been a land of immigrantslegal and illegal, and the issue of immigration sparks many heated debates across the nation. This was most recently demonstrated by the repeal of a California law that would allow illegal immigrants to get their drivers licenses. This is a complicated matter delves not only into the rights of illegal immigrants, but also into those of citizens of this country.

Illegal immigration is complicated in itself.

California has a large illegal workforce, particularly in the agriculture industry. These workers are often willing to do the most undesired jobs. When they are in a competitive line of work, they will often work longer hours for less pay. The economy of California is affected greatly by this continual underclass of illegal workers. Some Californians believe that all illegal immigrants should be deported, no matter what the effect on the economy. Others think the solution lies in border control- it takes the average Mexican immigrant almost a decade to get a green card. They say that if the borders were easier to get through legally, it would reduce the number of undocumented people in the state.

The argument for licensed illegal immigrants lies in the fact that it would be a way to document them. Drivers involved in an accident in which an illegal immigrant was at fault would no longer have to pay for their damages, as there would be something with which to track the person at fault. Working illegal immigrants would be able to apply for a license using a taxpayer identification number rather than a social security number.

Others argue that illegal immigrants lawbreakers, and that they

should not be rewarded for their behavior. "It should be easier to become legal in this country, but the people who are here illegally aren't entitled to the same rights as legal residents," comments junior Kyle Pedro. Giving licenses drivers' would further enable illegal immigrants to lead normal lives in California. Besides being able to drive, they would now have a valid of form identification. For those who believe all illegal immigrants should be immediately deported, it seems unbelievable that the government is trying to help them at all. "Getting your license is a privilege, not a gift from taxpaying citizens," says junior Pat Filipelli.

Recently, there were several walkouts across the state to protest the repeal

from workers the Canal district of San Rafael marched to the Civic Center. Many illegal immigrants readily defend their case. They feel that because they work in California to provide services for citizens, they are entitled to more rights.

The problems of illegal immigration are not going to be solved overnight. Whether you agree with it or not, there is a large illegal population in the United States.

The fact that the illegal immigrant population is both largely employed and paying taxes just makes it all the more complicated. Although the law repealed, it is obvious that this issue is not dead, and will continue to be debated and discussed well into the

In 1969, NASA astronaut Neil Armstrong made history by setting foot on the moon, sparking world celebration and fulfilling President Kennedy's promise to put a man on the moon by the end of the decade.

Thirty-five years later, the United States is again heading to the moon, and this time we would like to travel


even further. President Bush unveiled a new 26-year plan this January to establish a permanent colony on the lunar surface by 2020 and send a manned mission to Mars by 2030. While many lawmakers from both sides of the aisle have lauded

the president's new plan, many have called into question its cost and relevance.

The plan itself calls for several ambitious steps, including the replacement and retirement of the space shuttle by 2010, in time for the completion of the International Space Station. By 2015, another manned expedition is supposed to arrive on the moon and work on a permanent colony should have begun. By 2020, the colony should be complete and NASA will be preparing for a manned expedition to Mars, to be launched from the lunar base. Throughout this period, NASA will be

conducting continuous experiments on the long-term effect of low gravity and radiation on humans.

Though much of the funding for these projects will come from redistribution of NASA's \$86 billion budget, the president will be asking for an increase in NASA's funding, and many critics are decrying it. They



point both to trouble at home that requires the extra funding and to competition with the People's Republic of China, a rapidly emerging space power. One environmental activist even warned of a possible extraterrestrial arms race between the U.S. and China. The president has defended himself on both of these charges, saying that the money is not an issue and that he will welcome any international cooperation, calling the new explorations a "journey, not a race." Either way, the U.S. is finally planning a return to the final frontier.

When was the last time vou heard someone use the words "slammer," "stack," and "milkcap" in the same sentence? It's been a while. The pog phenomenon that took up the children of the mid-'90s like ducks in a tidal wave has died down quite a bit in the last few years. The game that was once the center of our youth has become close to obsolete in today's society. Most can still vaguely remember what the game was about, but for those less fortunate, here's a refresher course.

Pogs is a game between two or more people, each holding their own amount of caps along with a thicker, usually wooden, metal, or plastic "slammer." The players first agree on a certain amount of pogs to put in at the beginning. They

caps right-side up, an equal part of the stack belonging to each competitor. One person goes first. The participant takes a slammer and hits, or "slams" the pile with enough force to send the pogs flying. The ones that land upsidedown are kept by that player. The stack is reformed with the remaining pogs, and the other players then take their turns. The players continue to assault the stack until all the pogs have been flipped. The stack is then refreshed with more pogs. The game ends when one player has won all the pogs or when the participants agree on a draw. Though some did enjoy playing the actual game, most children of the day simply collected pogs.

Though the craze began in the 1990's, the famous caps actually originated in the late 1800's. In 1889, the milk cap was trademarked by H.P. and S.I. Barnhart. Though meant originally to seal milk bottles, they were also the right size and shape to become a toy. Soon enough, Hawaiian children created a "flipping game" with these mysterious caps. The most popular of caps was one from a tropical juice called POG (Passion fruit, Orange, and Guava). The game was passed on from one Hawaiian generation to another until 1994, when the game became popular. Toy companies in the other states recognized the simplicity in the creation of these items and took advantage of it. To maintain evidence of its origin, they named the toy after the Hawaiian juice. Pogs advertising all sorts of things were put out in two varieties: normal-size caps, and larger ones called slammers. Eventually, the majority of popular companies put out a line of pogs along with the rest of their merchandise. A couple years ago, Taco Bell used pogs to promote Star Wars: Episode I.

While most students are able to retain memories of this unique period time

in their childhoods, some are not so fortunate. When asked if he remembered what pogs were, Sophomore Erik Steffenson replied, "Pogs? You mean sgop spelled backwards?" The pogs culture may never again be as influential as it was in the 1990's, but it will forever remain a part of our history and our childhoods.

Don't Leave the House! It's Friday the 13th

By all appearances, this day is no different than any other day; the sun rises, people head off to work and school, commuters sit through heinous traffic, etcetera. This day, however, happens to be Friday the 13th, a day in which superstitious folk know to take extra care to avoid black cats, breaking mirrors, and walking under ladders. People suffering from paraskevidekatriaphobia will probably stay in bed all day- they possess an irrational fear of Friday the 13th. But from where and when did this deep-rooted fear originate? The superstition cloaking this fated day stems from ancient religious beliefs regarding both Friday and the number thirteen.

In ancient times, before Catholic and Protestant religions were developed, Fridays were holy days celebrated by pagans. Friday itself was named after Freya, a Norse goddess of fertility and marriage, and Friday was her holy day. When Catholicism became the dominant religion, its leaders deemed the pagan goddess a witch and declared Fridays to be unholy. (Also, according to Christian theology, Friday was the day Adam and Eve left the Garden of Eden, as well as the day Jesus was crucified and the Great Flood began.) Fridays in general became dreaded; people were cautioned never to start a journey, get married, sail a ship, or even begin a letter on a Friday. Combine these facts with the ominous qualities of the number thirteen, and Friday the 13th would appear to be the most unlucky day of all.

The number thirteen represented femininity in ancient patriarchal religions, and was also considered holy in matriarchal pagan cultures because it represented the number of menstrual cycles in a year. Thus, the number was vilified in Catholic religion. In addition, the Bible states that there were 13 people present at the Last Supper, after which Jesus was betrayed by one of his disciples. Thirteen also represents the meeting of 12 witches and the devil according to Christian theology. Superstition warns never to eat at a table with 13 people, for the first one to leave the table will die within the year.

By the late 1800's, Friday the 13th began to be widely feared, stemming from both superstition of Friday and the number 13. Accidents and disasters occurring on this day began to be attributed to the frightful bad luck of Friday the 13th, though many disregard the fact that accidents happen every day of the year. Because of superstition originating from thousands of years ago, Friday the 13th is generally viewed as a day better spent safely indoors.



Charles Dickens explains this feeling of déjà vecu in David Copperfield: "We have all some experience of a feeling, that comes over us occasionally, of what we are saying and doing having been said and done before, in a remote time - of our having been surrounded, dim ages ago, by the same faces, objects, and circumstances - of our knowing perfectly what will be said next, as if we suddenly remember it!" Anyone who has had a similar experience can attest that feelings like these involve more than just the sense of sight; familiar smells or tastes can give the impression of déjà vecu as well.

A rare but vivid occurrence of déjà vu that can give a person a familiar feeling or emotion is called déjà senti, or "already felt." Three features separate déjà senti from the everyday experienced deja vecu: 1) It is primarily a mental happening, 2) The person has no recollection of what is going to happen next, but is only familiar with the feeling, and 3) It seldom or never remains in the person's memory afterwards.

Have you ever been to a place for the first time and, for some strange reason, already know your way around, or are familiar with its surroundings and environment? This commonly mistaken event is known as deja visite, "already visited." While deja vecu has more to do with emotional occurrences and progresses, deja visite relates to geography. Theorists have concluded that déjà visité can also be an "out-of-the-body" experience in which a person is apparently able to travel abroad, leaving his body behind. Only reincarnation provides justification for this rare event.

After being informed about the three types of déjà vu, you can identify which form has influenced you. Surveys have indicated that these experiences tend to occur more frequently to young respondents between the ages of 15 and 25. This is why many teenagers have felt this mysterious but inspiring feeling before. Knowing what you know now, maybe this creepy feeling will no longer feel quite so creepy.



Stonehenge

Haunts-R-Us

Whether you have a firm belief in the supernatural or ridicule it completely, haunted houses have always been a great topic of gossip, as well as a theme for innumerable horror movies. It seems every area claims the right to some form of haunting, and the Bay Area is no exception. Write them off as coincidences, paranoia, or the results of an active imagination if you will, but any true believer can cite a host of unexplained events and ghostly apparitions as evidence. Reports of hauntings in the Bay Area range all the way from a Toys-R-Us to the former penitentiary Alcatraz.

The Winchester Mystery House near San Jose is probably one of the most well known haunted houses in the area, its bizarre architecture covering 6 acres with 160 rooms. After the deaths of her husband, president of the Winchester gun



company, and child, Sarah Winchester began adding to the original eight rooms with her \$20 million inheritance in 1884. She believed that if she kept adding rooms, she would be able to confuse the spirits of those killed by Winchester guns and protect herself from them. The house has 4 floors, 2,000 doors, 40 staircases, 47 fireplaces, 17 chimneys and 10,000 windows. Construction went on all

day, every day for 38 years. Stairways end in ceilings, doors open to the outside from upper floors or lead nowhere at all, windows look into other rooms, and secret passageways are hidden throughout the house. Among other occurences, apparitions, cold spots and ghostly organ music are reported; its tourist appeal stems from curiosity about the supernatural as well as the house itself.

As for the aforementioned Toys-R-Us, it lies on the former grounds of a farm in Sunnyvale. The ghost of farmhand John Johnson is said to haunt the premises, looking for his lost love Elizabeth Murphy. He died from an accident chopping wood in the orchard. Cameras have recorded a shadowy figure moving along the aisles at night, and he knocks over boxes at night and plays other such pranks.

Alcatraz, used as a U.S. military prison from 1859-1933 and as a federal prison until 1963, is believed to be haunted in numerous ways. It was used to house some of the most dangerous criminals in the country, such as Al Capone and "Machine Gun" Kelly, under the harshest of conditions. Cell doors mysteriously open and close, and the sounds of banging on doors, voices, screams, crashes, and footsteps are reported. An intense feeling of being watched and cold spots are also reported, and there are stories of prisoners and guards seeing "glowing eyes" and the appearances of phantoms.

These are just a few examples of the haunted places in the Bay Area and their stories, but whether they are unfounded rumors or not is up for interpretation. The Aurora Borealis

The aurora borealis, more commonly known as the Northern Lights, has perplexed man for millennia. The mysterious lights that streak across the night sky are deeply rooted in the mythology of many different cultures of the northern hemisphere. Who do we think we are protecting from sex education?

Children are the future and education is the tool they need for tomorrow. Every year it is said that there needs to be more education so youth can prepare themselves for things to come. But though there seems to be a strong commitment to education, limited steps have been taken to verse students in real-life areas, especially regarding the taboo issue of sex.


The question sex whether education should be taught at home or in school seems to be overshadowing the real issue: teens don't know about sex. Statistics show that one in four teenagers contract an STD/STI each year in the US. Maybe if teenagers were taught about different forms of protection, they could reduce this alarming figure. But, Novato Unified Distric has made School sex education very limited. Biology teacher Jennifer Yorty explains, "We can only teach the bio aspect - what causes STDs and how they spread. We are not allowed to teach about different protection."

The Science department at San Marin offers a two to three day lesson about STDs/STIs in Biology and Integrated

II. In Biology, students fill out a packet of information and perform a lab that demonstrates how STDs/STIs are transmitted and how fast they spread. In Integrated II, REACH, a peer-led program for Marin County teens, comes and discusses different STDs/STIs and risks.

Many assume that the new Health class teaches about sex; however, this is misconception. Health Ken Feldman explains, "According to the district, it is an abstinencecourse." based curriculum doesn't go into sex in any sort of detail, but it does discuss STDs/STIs during the Disease unit. Feldman stresses the course description, "This is a health class...not a sex education class." The course focuses on physical, mental, and emotional health. Feldman's goal is to give students a foundation so they are able to make responsible decisions on their own.

Though basic facts about STDs/STIs are covered briefly in these three courses, students aren't retaining the information. Out of 60 students surveyed anonymously, only four, or seven percent, answered correctly that chlamydia is the most common STD/STI



in the US. Meanwhile 38% and 50% thought HIV and herpes respectively to be the most prevalent. Some might say that knowing the leading STD/STI is not essential information; they agree with Feldman that the decisions made are what are important.

Yet, 46% of students who identified themselves as being sexually active use protection less than always, with 23% admitting to never using protection.

Neither district nurse Laura Lichtner Wyrun nor San Marin nurse Julie Leutbecher could be reached for comment regarding whether the district plans to take any steps in helping to decrease these figures.

There is a clear need for more sex-ed, and non-school affiliated groups like REACH are trying to meet this need and educate students. REACH is a peer education health group that deals with sex, drugs, and alcohol, tackling these tough issues by teaching in comfortable environments that are led by trained Senior Laura students. Cherkas, a "Facilitator of Schools" REACH member, explains, "It's dangerous. Even if people know that they should protect themselves, they have to know how to do it right. They need to get the complete information." Programs like REACH are making progress throughout Marin County, but NUSD is an obstacle. "NUSD is pretty much the most backwards of all Marin County school districts. It is the only district that is still abstinence-only. Kids at other schools are much more educated," says Cherkas. For example, REACH sponsored the Condom Crusade last year, a fundraiser in which sex education information was handed out and local bands performed. When the program tried to put up flyers for the event on NUSD campuses, the district intervened saying that the word "condom" unacceptable. press time, REACH was trying to get approval for a condom table on high school campuses for National Condom Week, February 8 to February 15. They will only give information and try to convince people to be safe, not give out condoms; yet, even this is receiving opposition.

In the face of controversy we are left with facts. This newspaper is in no position to solve the issue of where this education should come from, but it is obvious that students aren't receiving what they need. Somebody needs to step up and teach a comprehensive sex education to students. Groups such as REACH are trying to fill this void, but district policy is preventing them. If things are left as they are, statistics are only going to become more alarming, and the youth of today will enter the "realworld" ignorant about this extremely important issue.

Bermuda Triangle

The Martin Mariner was included in the search party and was also a contributor to many people's assumptions about Bermuda Triangle. Many have believed that the Mariner disappeared along with Flight 19. Unfortunately for fans of the supernatural it did not vanish; it exploded 23 seconds after takeoff. explosion was a common occurrence caused by a malfunctioning gas tank. Right before Fort Lauderdale lost contact with Flight 19, the plane had been traveling farther towards the Atlantic coastline. Norma Gaffron in, Great Mysteries. 




