



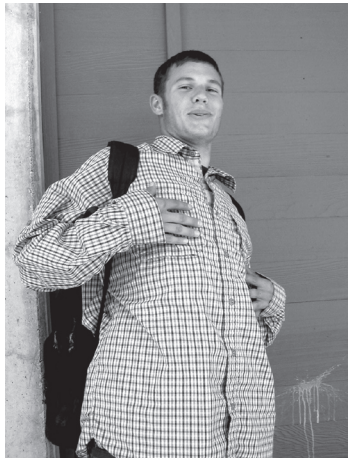

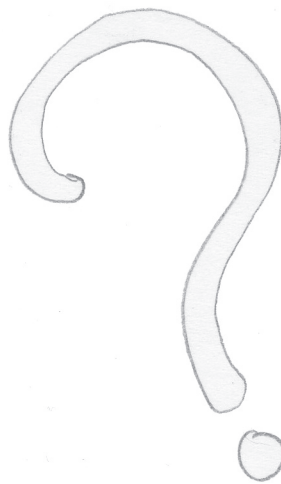

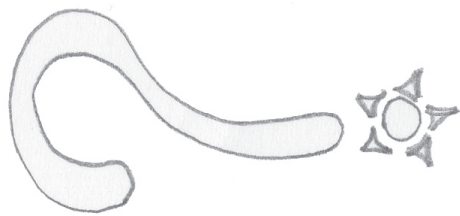

Cheaters Beware

As we've all recently become aware, there is a new integrity policy at San Marin. This new policy, created by a group of San Marin staff, is much stricter than the former policy, which left discipline up to teacher discretion. Under the new policy, punishments become increasingly stronger with each offense and new definitions of plagiarism and cheating are given.

According to the new policy, a first offense results in a loss of credit for the assignment and notification of both the student's parents and the administration. A second offense reduces the student's course grade by one letter grade for the quarter, results in a conference with the teacher, parents, department head and an administrator,

and a record is placed in the student's permanent cumulative file. Finally, a third offense results in a failing grade for the course, a suspension, and removal from an AP or honors course.

Cheating is defined in a similar manner to that of Sonoma State University; in fact, two of the eight definitions of plagiarism and cheating provided were copied directly from the Sonoma State Cheating and plagiarism policy. Cheating is primarily defined as "copying, in part or whole, or otherwise acquired from another's examination, paper [including homework assignments], mathematical calculation[s], research, creative project of the like;" while plagiarism is primarily defined as "the

act of incorporating the ideas, words of sentences, paragraphs, or parts thereof without appropriate acknowledgement and representing the product as one's own work."

While the new policy may be harsh, it is considered necessary by teachers to stem the tide of rampant cheating at San Marin. Furthermore, in college, plagiarism can often be grounds for expulsion. "Cheating is a character flaw," said Mrs. Kemp, one of the architects of the new policy. "If I was on the college admissions board and had to choose between a student with a DUI and a student who had plagiarized, I would choose the DUI." So, San Marin cheaters beware, your day of reckoning has come.

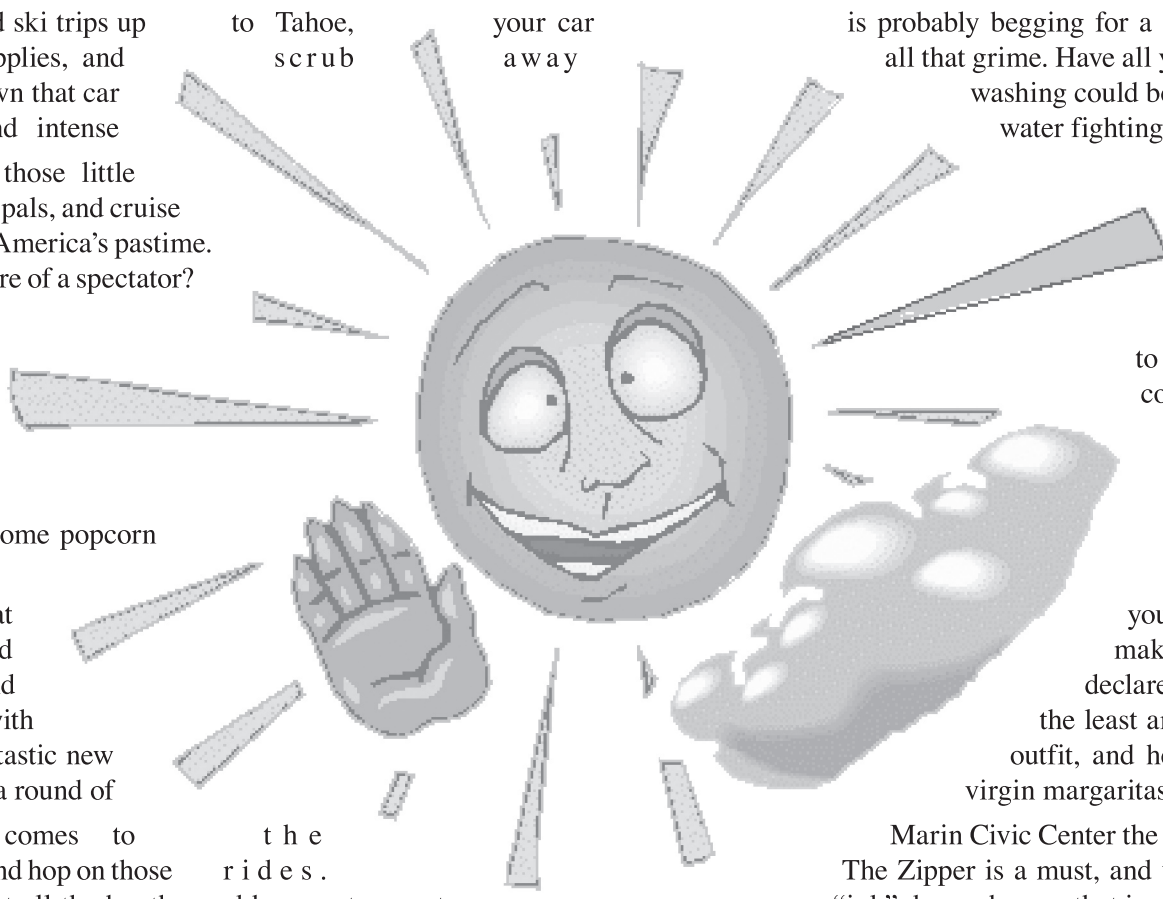

There are numerous private colleges that are just as good, even better, but don't get as much publicity. California:

Pomona College – Built in Claremont, the college is 35 miles east of downtown L.A. Competition to get in is tough; 86% of freshmen were in the top 10% of their class. **Quick stats:** avg. SAT: 1460,* avg. tuition: 28,370,** total student body: 1500.

Out-of-State:

Tulane – Situated in New Orleans, Louisiana, Attending this college

ensures that you'll never fall victim to boredom. Whether you're partying down on Bourbon Street during Mardi Gras or hitting up a local restaurant for some authentic gumbo. **Quick stats:** avg. SAT: 1344,* avg. tuition: \$33,346,** total student body: 13,214

Cornell – Opened in 1868, it is located in

Ithaca, New York. The New England campus lays a mere 60 miles southwest from Syracuse. **Quick stats:** avg. tuition: \$30,750, total student body: 20,334

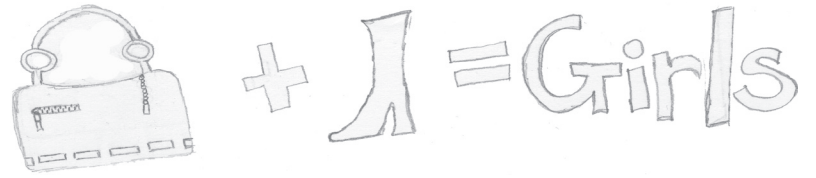

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Mt. Burdell: Hiker's Refuge

Looming over Novato at a lofty 1,560 ft., Mt. Burdell is a refuge for hikers, cyclists, equestrians and nature lovers. As Novato's only prominent natural land mark, Mt. Burdell has a long and interesting history especially in comparison with the rest of Novato.

Founded in 500 A.D., it was originally named Olompali by the Coast Miwok, meaning Southern Village. Climaxing in 1200 A.D., it was one of the largest villages in Marin. In 1843, 8,900 acres were granted to the last chief of the Olompali Miwok, Christianized Camilo Yanitia. When Yanitia sold the land to James Black in 1852, the true dispute began. Because Black left his only daughter, Mary, out of his will she supposedly bit off Black's signature and swallowed it after his death. This audacious action allowed her and her husband Galen Burdell to obtain the land in a legal case. Eventually, after years of attempting to sell Mt. Burdell, the Southern half was purchased by the Marin County Open Space District in 1978 and the Northern half was bought by the State of California.

Nevertheless, this somewhat turbulent past has not tarnished the natural beauty of Mt. Burdell. Having a new face for each of the four seasons, there is always something new to discover on Mt. Burdell. However, Spring is easily the best time to visit Mt. Burdell. During the Spring, especially just after the end of rain fall, a wide array of wild flowers are visible including fields of the California poppy. In addition, there are flocks of birds, including the notorious roaming turkeys, and at Secret Lake you can see tadpoles as they grow into frogs.

At any time of the year Burdell is a moderate hike with great scenery and views of Mt. Tam and the Petaluma River. Trails are easily reached on the South side along San Marin Drive, including San Andreas Fire Road off of San Andreas Drive, which is probably one of the more heavily trafficked trails. On the North Side, you can reach trails leading to Olompali Park.

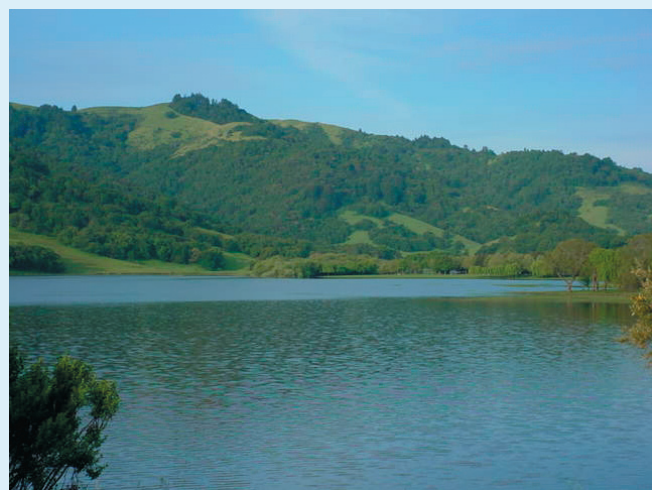

your stomach. Junior Julio Sanchez admitted, "the food tasted good, but my guts kind of resented later."

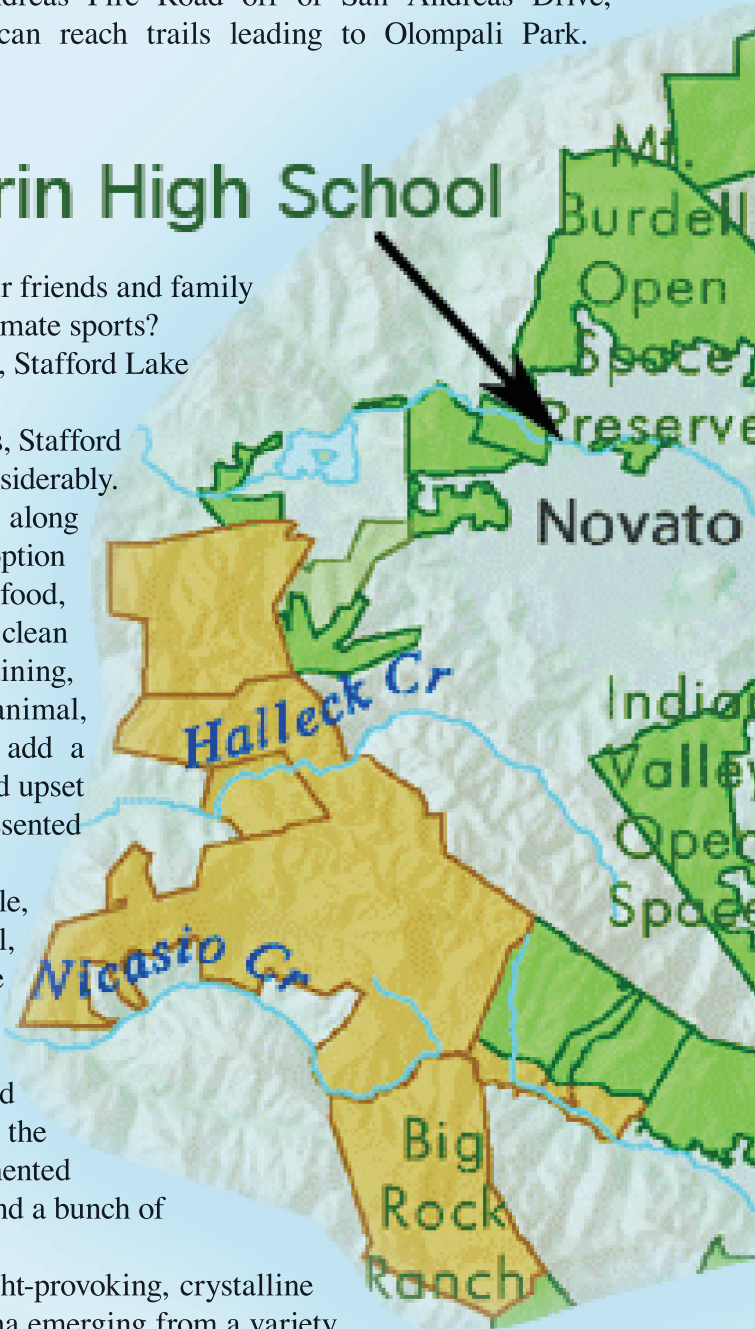

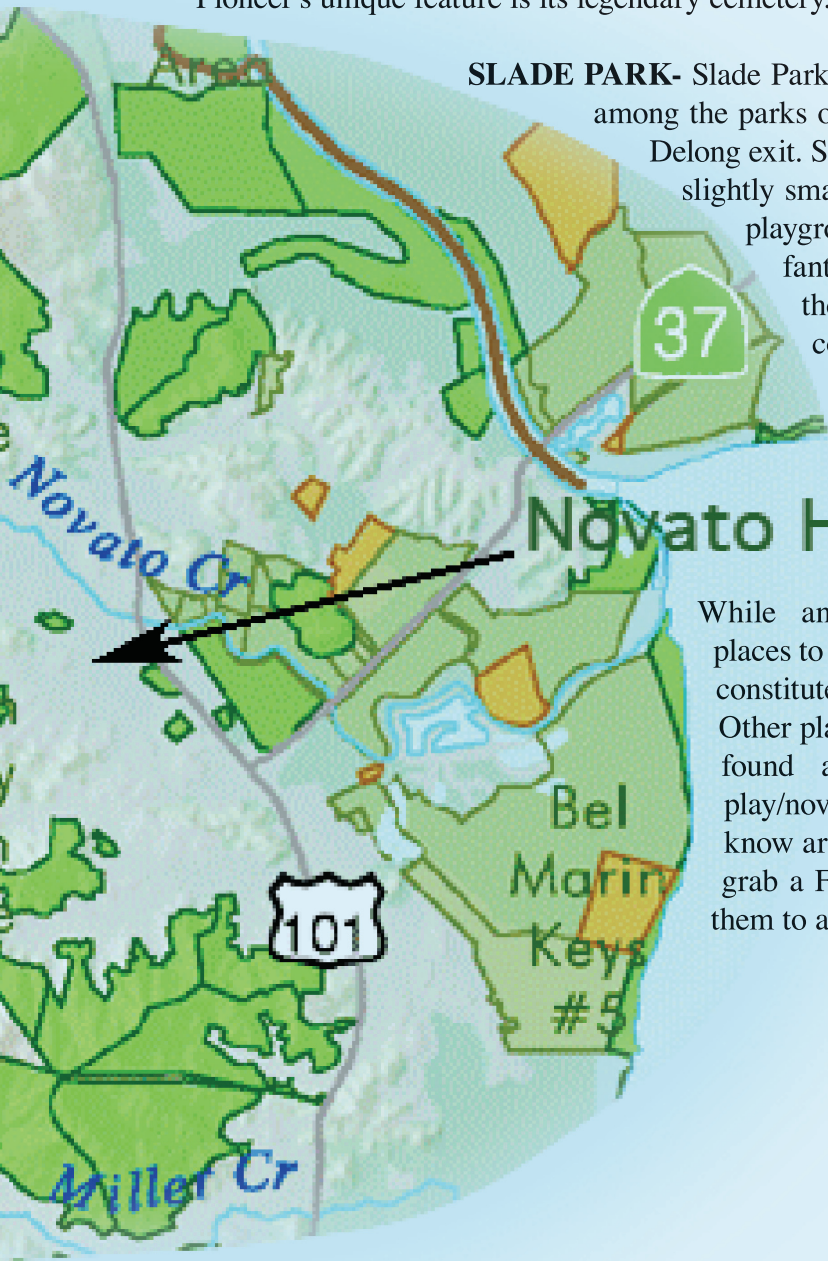

New SAT Scores FAQ

Last year, a score of 1400 was considered exceptional on the SAT. This year, that score is below average. On the old SAT, a 1400 was Ivy League standard. On the new SAT, that score will hardly get you into a state college. The changes to the SAT have raised questions among many students and parents. Two of the most common questions are "What is a good score on the new SAT?" and "Where will my scores take me?" Another common question is "How can I improve my score?"

The main difference between the old and new SAT is the addition of a writing section, which includes an essay. This writing section is nothing new; it used to be known as the SAT II Writing test. Also, the ETS replaced analogies in the verbal section with enhanced critical reading passages, and removed

quantitative comparison questions on the math section. The math section has also been expanded to cover second-year algebra material. Due to the addition of the writing section, the test has been lengthened from three hours to three hours and forty-five minutes now, the perfect score is now 2400 instead of 1600.

The new and old SAT scores are not proportional. You cannot find the old SAT equivalent of your new SAT scores simply by multiplying your new SAT scores by 2/3. Although the College Board has not released an official conversion chart, the Princeton Review came out with a preliminary old SAT to new SAT conversion chart. Based on these two charts,

you can estimate the old SAT equivalent of your new SAT score and gain a good sense of where your scores will take you. Remember, SAT

scores are just one factor college admissions look at. Your high school record and extracurricular activities also influence the decision.

Due to the changes to the SAT, many colleges have not decided on how to treat the new scores. Yet, The College Board has published a list of colleges that require the writing score at www.collegeboard.com/prof/counselors/tests/sat/about/sat_require.html. The College Board also says that colleges will not only look at your total score but also at your scores for each section. Many science and technology oriented schools such as Virginia Tech will look at your writing score, but they'll put more emphasis on your math score. On the other hand, many liberal arts

wondering how to do better next time. There are numerous classes and programs that claim will help you improve your score. These range from \$100 one-time strategy sessions to \$1000 prep programs. A complete listing of coaching classes is available at the college and career center. However, the effectiveness of coaching is questionable. According to the College Board, coached students are only slightly more

likely to have large score gains. About one-third of coached students experience little or no gain at all. Yet some test prep services guarantee score increases. Do not believe these "guarantees". The Princeton review promises a 3-point improvement on your ACT composite. I do not believe that a Princeton review class can help me score a perfect.

In my opinion, the best way to improve your SAT score is to practice. Get a SAT prep book and do all the sample questions and tests. When you have finished one book, get another. By doing hundreds of SAT questions, you will be exposed to a wide variety of question types. You will also become more familiar with the format of the test. Because you have seen these question types before, you will know how to tackle them during the real test. Good luck on your next test!

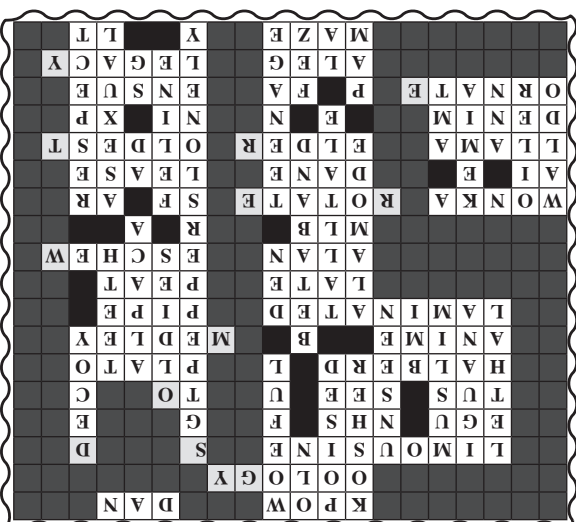

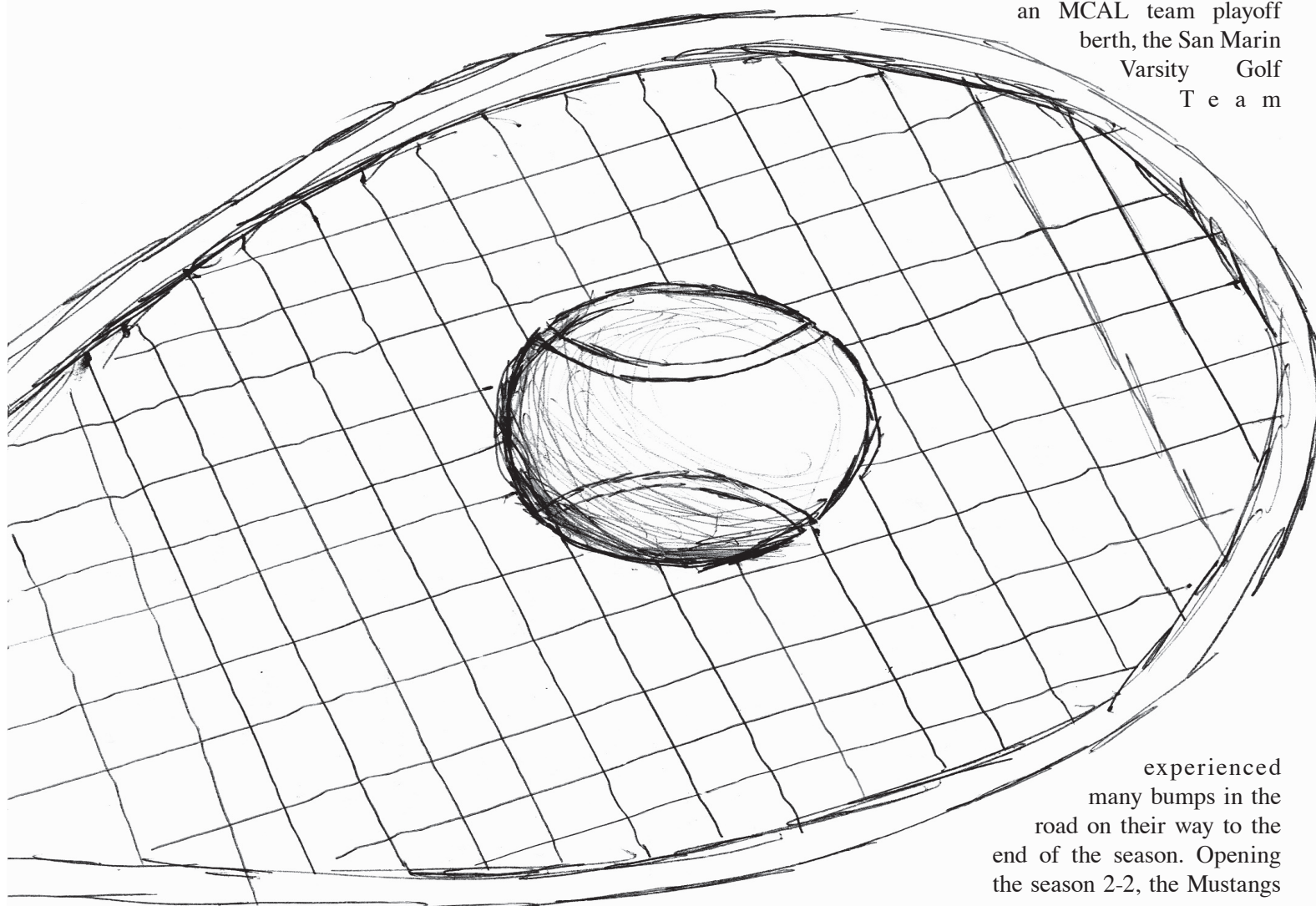
