XBOX 360 Takes Gamers by Storm

Microsoft gets a head start on next generation video game war against Sony and Nintendo by releasing its newest console, XBOX 360, on November 22, 2005. It release will be accompanied by eagerly awaited launch titles Perfect Dark Zero, Quake 4 and Project Gotham Racing 3.

The XBOX 360, at its heart, is just a computer—a very powerful computer. Its processor, custom designed by IBM, puts the fastest Intel processor on the market to shame. Its graphic capabilities

are on par with the latest graphics cards from ATi. The XBOX 360 will also support high definition video and Dolby 5.1 Surround Sound.

All this advanced hardware will enable the XBOX 360 to lend a much greater degree of realism to

sound actually allows you to hear the direction a sound is coming from. This level of detail will make video gaming a more immersive experience.

But the XBOX 360 is a lot more than just a video game console. It also attempts to take over your living room. The XBOX 360 will

allow you to play DVD movies and music. If you have Windows XP Media Center Edition 2005 and the optional universal media remote, you can even record TV shows and manage your digital photos, all through the XBOX 360.

The XBOX 360 was meant to do one thing for Microsoft—beat out Sony's PlayStation 3 as the foremost video game console on the market. It certainly has fulfilled its destiny. Thousands of avid gamers waited outside department stores at midnight on release day to grab the console. Enterprising merchants

are selling XBOX 360s on ebay for up to \$1000. It is now up to the PS3 and Nintendo Revolution to see if they can dethrone the XBOX 360. With gamers willing to pay three times the retail price for the new XBOX, it does not look easy for Sony and Nintendo.

Tookie Williams

On December 13, Tookie Williams, the founder of the Crips, is sentenced to die by lethal injection. After multiple appeals including a last ditch effort to characterize the forensic evidence against him as "junk science", Williams' last hope rests in the hands of Governor Schwarzenegger.

Tookie was condemned to die for a quadruple homicide in 1981, an incident which he continuously pled innocent to. He also claims that the

Los Angeles District Attorney's office violated his rights by not allowing any potential black jurors to sit on the jury.

Governor Schwarzenegger has agreed to hear Tookie Williams' petition for clemency on December



8. However, no governor has granted clemency in the state of California since Ronald Reagan. Even so, it is a governor's prerogative to grant clemency in cases where there may be mitigating circumstances.

In this case, Williams has seemed to turn his life around. He has become an anti-gang activist and a children's author, and has been nominated for the Nobel prize.

Tookie

Williams will be the second execution to take place this year, after Donald Beardslee was executed in January. Since the death penalty has been reinstated, 12 inmates have been executed.

Madrigal Feast is an awesome experience, and hopefully, the tradition continues for many years to come.

Cell Phone Ban on "Most Wanted List"

Cell phone distractions create 2,600 deaths and 330,000 injuries in the United States every year. Talking on the cell-phone while driving is becoming more dangerous by the minute as cell phones become more popular with teenagers.

In response to a study on the effects electronics use while driving, many state legislators are trying to pass a bill banning the use of all cell phones while driving, regardless if you use a headset. The federal cellphone ban was put on the National Transportation Safety Board's (NTSB) "Most Wanted List" for transportation safety improvements. The agency showed its proposal to all thirty-nine states that have not yet banned cellphone use, in hope to improve our nations safety.

Learning to drive is a big responsibility for teens and they should give it their full attention. If you're talking on your cell phone the NTSB sees you as a threat to your safety and the safety of the drivers around you. Using your cell phone appropriately to assure your safety and the safety of others should be reason enough to pay attention. If you are not fully paying attention to your driving you run a very high risk of getting into an accident. Studies show that the reaction time of cell-phone users dramatically decrease, yielding a high risk of getting into an accident. Not only are drivers paying less attention to their driving, they're also driving slower and creating traffic. Due to slow reaction rate you are less aware of your speed and distance, which can lead to accidents.

"Learning how to drive while distracted is definitely a recipe for disaster,"saidNTSB'sactingchairman, Mark Rosenker. If your early months are spent driving recklessly than you develop a foundation for bad driving. The amount of time spent driving isn't a reliable test for the type of driver you are. Rather, how you drive and how much you pay attention institute the type of driver you will become. The new study also found that motorists talking on their phones were less responsive than a drunk driver with a blood alcohol level of 0.08. If we make a point of not driving under the influence then why do we run the risk by letting our phone conversation distract us from our driving?

Eleven states and the District of Columbia have already restricted cell phone use among novice drivers, and some have banned hand-held cell phones completely. Many states are unsure about completely forbidding all drivers from using cell phones, but are willing to stop use of cell-phones by new drivers. This means teenagers who have recently received their license or anyone under the age of 18 would not be allowed to use their cell phone while driving.

Drivers have to take their eyes off the road to dial, and people become so sucked into their conversations that the ability to concentrate on their driving decreases and becomes a threat to other cars, pedestrians and yourself. The study has also found that drivers have a harder time maintaining a constant speed, staying in lanes, and judging distances. In the last five years, the popularity of cell phones has grown enormously and so have the number of accidents in the United States. By banning the use of cell phones, the roads would be safer and the number of accidents would decrease dramatically.

Holiday Movie Guide by Paul Himmelstein





monkey falls in love with a hot blonde (Naomi Watts) and jumps on buildings to display his undying love. Cute.


The Producers, December 16

A Letter From Clifford: Part Two

Dear San Marin High School,

Recently, it has been a very interesting period of time for the politics of Latvia. The way in which this country will plan to build itself will be very interesting after a long occupation of the Soviet Union and also by having a long history of being occupied by many other nations as well. This question of how this country plans to move forward floats to the top of my thoughts, as it was recently Latvia's Independence Day. Living here in Rezekne, I have had many people that have exposed me to the laws put in place by the Latvian government.

Lately, I was able to sit down for an hour with a very bright student, journalist, singer, and actress from my school, Yelena Stupak, who described a lot about the current situation with the Latvian people, government, and how they affect the community of Rezekne. We talked about everything from the recent joining of Latvia with the European Union, Latvia's Independence and all of the recent changes over the last 15 or so years that has occurred in Latvia.

About the European Union, Lena says that the European Union is both good and bad. The good parts are that the boarders are now open, and now students and people can go abroad to study and work much easily now. This is good for many adults in Latvia because there is not a lot of opportunity here. But now it is a little easier to find work in some other European countries because of the addition into the European Union. The bad part exists with the prices that are rising which makes it "hard to live by" especially as Lena describes Latvia as the "countryside of the European Union".

When questioned for thoughts about Latvia's Independence and government, she told me that Independent Latvia has been "not so good", and there is not much to like about the national government. Though reluctant to fully describe her opinion, Lena revealed that there are many problems with the rules set by the Latvian government, especially in order to gain citizenship. Many people who have lived in Latvia all of their lives have had trouble gaining citizenship because they cannot pass the Latvian Language or Latvian History tests, as many people for all of their lives spoke only Russian during the Soviet Occupation. People are also denied citizenship if they are born during certain years of the Soviet Occupation. I was told that the problem is that Latvia has almost always been occupied by outside nations, such as the Russians, Polish, Swedes, etc. and it doesn't know how to be independent. Thus, as Latvia has had their independence recently, it hasn't been without many very big growing pains that have divided the country distinctly through ethnicity- Russian and Latvian-, especially as the government wants to detach itself completely from the Soviet Occupation. This plants the seed of exclusion and segregation as the national government will mark many of the people only as Russian or alien, and not Latvian.

Finally, even with the political problems of Latvia, there is not a shortage of love for the country from the people who live in it. As Lena puts it "I love my country...the golden autumns...the very calm and peaceful towns that are like big villages where everyone knows each other...the reserved but fun people... [and mostly] the beautiful and green nature." Latvia might be a photographer's and adventurer's dream place to visit. There are many beautiful landscapes with the Baltic Sea to the west, the long winding river the runs through the country, and the countless lakes, both big and small, with stunning forests throughout the country. Each season is special and wonderfully unique with golden autumns, white wonderful winters, always-sunny summers, and beautiful green springs. There are countless historical ruins, monuments, castles, interesting cathedrals and churches, and even medieval towns in the country. Latvia is a place to be enjoyed by all people, despite the political turmoil that many of its people must face. And the people of Latvia too will feel no shame enjoying their open land and nature, and neither do many tourists.

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





My Bridge Is Better Than Your Bridge

After sitting through hours of lectures and cranking out endless homework assignments, physics students were finally given the opportunity to pit their knowledge creativity against each other's a toothpick bridge competition. Students were month given a construct toothpick bridge spanning 20 cm (slightly less than inches) and weighing less than 85 g (about 3 ounces). Each bridge was tested to the breaking point and scored by dividing the weight it held over the weight of the bridge. The bridge

competition—a simple equilateral triangle (for kids not yet in geometry, that means a triangle with three sides of equal length) reinforced by another upside-down equilateral triangle inside. Her bridge weighted 82.5 g and held at least 70,000 g. Also owing to lack of equipment, her bridge also could not be broken.

Honorable Mentions:

Fili Ramirez was the only student not in AP Physics (all four winners came from AP Physics) whose bridge held more than 1000 times its own weight. Therefore, we award him an Honorable Mention for a commendable effort against tough competition. Alex Randall and Jeff McLaughlin built arguably the best-looking bridge. Their bridge, an

arch-truss hybrid based on the Richmond-San Rafael Bridge was spray painted gold and coated with glitter. Therefore, we award them Honorable Mention for their bling-bling. Max McDonald and **Nicole** Lundgren's bridge held more weight upside down than right side up. Therefore, we award them Honorable Mention for wacky design.





Car Accidents

Nearly inevitable for the majority of current drivers, car accidents can be either devastating or very minor. However, nobody wants to be in one, despite the severity. It doesn't matter if you think you're the best driver at San Marin; it could happen to you! With the roads becoming more and more slick with winter rains and the constant introduction of new high school drivers, it's crucial to know what to do just in case you dent your dad's BMW.

The best way to get through an accident is to be prepared. New cars come equipped with first aid kits, road flares, and everything you need in order to get through the anxiety-filled ordeal. If you don't currently have a first-aid kit in your car, it's highly recommended by the police and emergency officials that you purchase one. It's also a great idea to keep post-it notes and a pen in the glove compartment of your car in order to jot down the other driver's information. Still, it's extremely hard to be fully prepared for an accident, physically and mentally, because they are completely unexpected. Luckily for you, this procedure was developed specifically so you wouldn't wet yourself and so you could keep your wits.

1. After the accident occurs, pull over to the side of the road where it is safe and so your vehicle is out of the way. Remember to put on your hazard lights if you are along a busy road to give oncoming drivers ample warning. If you're having an anxiety attack, just take several deep breaths to calm yourself before you get out of the car. And whatever you do, DON'T DRIVE AWAY. That's considered a "hit-andrun" and is highly illegal!

2. Be very courteous and calm while talking to the person that you hit or that hit you. It's not a great idea to be screaming at the top of your lungs, as it might get you into a whole lot of trouble later on during police intervention. If there is a lot of damage or if you are planning on reporting the accident to your insurance company, be sure to call the police in order to get a statement. You can still put in a claim at your insurance company, but it's much easier if you have a police statement. Also, if there is anyone injured, common sense dictates calling 911. Be sure to then exchange insurance information and write down the driver's license number.

3. After you leave the scene of

the accident and are home, be sure to call your insurance company as quickly as you can to state your claim. The sooner you deal with it, the easier it will be. Also, California state law states that if you are involved in an accident where there was more than \$750 worth of property damage or anyone was injured or killed, you must fill out a form reporting the accident within 10 days of the accident. It doesn't matter drivers sooner or later

if you caused the accident or not, you MUST report it if it meets the certain criteria. If you don't submit the report, your driving privilege could be suspended.

In the end, the only way to prevent accidents is to practice safe driving techniques. They're fairly obvious; don't speed, don't run red lights, check both ways before entering an intersection, etc. Also, California created the "sixmonths" that law

states that new drivers under the age of 18 cannot drive with anyone under the age of 20 for the first six months of having their license. Being a new driver and being distracted by your friends are two things that don't mix well, so try to avoid doing it. While driving, use common sense. And remember, getting into a small accident isn't the end of the world. After all, it happens to many




